For the first time in the history of the Crary High School, a football team was inaugurated here. Credit for the team's excellent showing, must go to the coaches--Mr. Day, and Mr. Keefe, who worked faithfully to produce a powerful six-man team.

With a handicap of stage-fright in the first game, the boys held Michigan well in hand. Their peak performance was reached in the game against Petersburg.

The line-up included: Harold Dahl, Leo Rutten, Bill Conroy, Eldon Lucken, Fred Robinson, Elmer McCaffery, Joseph Van-Steenvoort, Howard Parker, Edward Allard, and Duane Stenseth.

The fellows played an excellent brand of ball, and acquitted themselves creditably. Most of the scoring was due to the rushes of the husky 185 pound fullback, Leo Rutten. Bill Conroy was the only other player who scored a touchdown during the season.

The peak of a splendid year was reached in the last game with Petersburg

The members of the squad included: Harold Dahl, Alphonsus Wagner, Fred Robinson, Bill Conroy, Elmer McCaffery, Leo Rutten, Joseph VanSteenvoort, Duane Stenseth, Roy Steinhaus, Wesley Fronk, and Pat Kavanaugh. Edward Allard, Lloyd Thorson, and Howard Parker were dropped out due to various difficulties they encountered.

The loss of Dahl, Wagner, and Rutten through graduation will be felt keenly, since Dahl and Wagner were first stringers, and Rutten a capable reserve.

The Crary fellows faced tough opposition nobly, and fought hard, every step

of the way.

The strongest teams in the regular games with teams, were Starkweather and Lakota. The Stormkings displayed excellence in long shots, and the Lakotans had a very superior passing style. The home team garnered fifteen points in each of the contests with Lakota, and played them to a standstill on their own floor, giving them some bad moments.

Through some difficulty, the Michigan Bulldogs gave the boys a taste of defeat which only gave more determination. At the next meeting with the Bulldogs, they

walloped them 27 to 16.

In the game with Webster, at Webster, Crary's offense clicked with astonishing facility, and even the reserves capably handled the last quarter. This encounter ended with Webster on the short end of a 28-6 score.

In a very close, defensive battle, the boys played Tokio, but Tokio emerged the winner 17 - 15. In the return game, the Crary players advanced the ball well and rapidly but did not seem to be able to

hit the loop.

In a poorly played game, the Devils Lake Seconds set Crary back to the tune of 16-8. In the return game, Devils Lake could not penetrate the close defense of Crary, and as a result they had the misfortune on their part of being defeated 24 - 13.

The regular class tournaments were held again this year, and the Junior class dominated both the girls' and boys tourneys, and emerged as the high school

champions.


